

Licensing Task Force Construction Subcommittee

INITIATIVES AND PRIORITIES WORKSHEET

As stated in the Governor’s Executive Order, the Task Force shall provide an initial written report to the Governor with recommendations and strategies to reform the professional occupational licensing system for the purpose of:

- identifying and removing burdens and barriers faced by licensees that are not necessary to protect the public; and
- improving access to and availability of professional services for citizens across Montana, including rural communities.

EXECUTIVE ORDER INITIATIVES
